
Simon Newell Early Independent Researcher Award 2021

Award Background

The award, generously funded by [Sparks](#) and [GOSH Charity](#), is awarded annually for excellence in research to an outstanding young medically qualified research worker in British paediatrics. The award consists of a trophy, together with £1,000 to the winner and a further £1,000 to the department in which they work, for the purchase of equipment or other expenses connected with their research. The winner will be awarded the prize at the RCPCH Annual Conference in 2021, with a free day entry pass and expenses covered for attendance.

The award is named after Dr Simon Newell, a renowned and widely respected neonatologist and paediatrician who had a passion to encourage the next generation of paediatric clinicians and researchers. He made an enormous contribution to neonatal medicine across the UK and was a great advocate for paediatric health. Simon was connected to Sparks throughout his career, first as a researcher, then a member of the Medical Advisory Committee and later a Trustee. This award has been named in his memory and as recognition of the tremendous work that he did.

Award eligibility

To be eligible for the Simon Newell award you need to:

1. Be no more than one year prior to receiving your certificate of completion of training (CCT) or three years since receiving your CCT.
2. Have a strong interest in, and engage in research related to paediatrics.
3. Be on the route to achieving research independence.

Application Process

To enter for this award please complete the application form with a copy of your concise CV (maximum of 3 pages). We recommended that you include details of your academic experience, any grants or prizes that you have been awarded and any scientific publications in your CV.

Please note that the application should be completed by the potential recipient of the award. The support from a suitable sponsor is required to complete the submission. Sign-off is granted by providing a signature (e-signature is allowed).

Please send your submission to research@rcpch.ac.uk with the subject line 'RCPCH Simon Newell Award application'. Both the applicant and sponsor should be copied into the submission email. Please return no later than **midnight on the 30 November 2020**. Please ensure that you receive a receipt of application following your entry to this award.

Guidance to Applicants - Review Process

A review panel, made up of RCPCH and GOSH Charity representatives, will review the applications and select the winner.

The reviewers will consider the application form and the CV together. They will be looking for submissions that highlight the applicant's research interest and achievements, demonstrate originality of thought and communicates the potential impact on child health and clinical practice.

The results of the competition will be announced in February 2021 and the prize will be awarded at the RCPCH Annual Conference in 2021.

The closing date for receipt of submissions for the award is **30 November 2020**. Once we have received your application you will receive a receipt of application within two working days. If you have not received a receipt of application, please contact us.

What information do we collect from you?

This privacy notice relates to the information we collect for the Simon Newell Early Independent Researcher Award. To enable us to consider the submission, we require the following information as part of the submission form:

- name, address, contact number and email address of the applicant
- CV and research work of the applicant
- name, address, contact number and email address of the sponsor

As part of the process, we also require the contact information of the nominator so that we can keep them informed about the nomination process. Submissions for the prize are voluntary and we will only use the personal data you have provided on this form for the application process.

Who do we share your information with?

Your personal data will be held within the Research & Evidence team. The adjudication panel, made up of representatives from RCPCH, Sparks and GOSH Charity, will review the applications. Your name will also be published on the RCPCH website and the Annual Conference programme. We will never transfer your information outside of the EEA. How long do we keep your information?

We will retain applications for five years from the year of submission in line with the College Retention Policy. We will then destroy unsuccessful applications and transfer successful nominations to the College's historical archive for long term preservation.

Your rights
