

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Tell me about your project in one sentence...

Giving families the tools to understand and communicate about cancer to improve how children cope and build resilience during a challenging uncertain time.

What does your project do?

Our project promotes education, understanding and communication between a parent/carer and their child when the parent has been diagnosed with cancer.

Where does your project take place?

Multiple sites. Within homes, schools, hospitals and cancer support organisations.

Who does your project help?

Children affected by parental cancer, families, and adults who need support talking to children about cancer.

Who is involved in your project?

Children, young people, parents, carers, healthcare professionals, teachers, and charity support staff.

When does your project happen?

When a child/parent/family requires support at the sites where the project is running.

What is your top success or achievement for your project?

Recognition amongst healthcare professionals that the resources created are needed to support families affected by cancer, winning two BMA awards for Children Information and Innovation, and receiving feedback from a clinical psychologist who reported the positive impact of our project on a self-harming young person.

Anything else you would like to tell us about your child health engagement project? Next year we are embedding our project within Guy's and St Thomas' Cancer Centre where we will be training cancer nurses in how to use our resources as well as designing a new method to give consistent support for a patient's who has dependent children.

Young people share their expertise with hospital staff in training sessions to improve communication with young patients and improve healthcare for young people

What does your project do?

Empowers young people to train healthcare staff in areas of their expertisecommunicating with young people, caring for young people with additional needs etc.

Where does your project take place?

Blackpool Victoria Hospital

Who is involved in your project?

Young people, local school teachers, staff at the hospital- from a wide range of disciplines

When does your project happen?

Approx. every 4-6 months. Done several sessions so far

What is your top success or achievement for your project?

Staff have made pledges to show how they will work differently to involve young people in their care and treat each person as an individual to cater for their needs



Tell me about your project in one sentence...

Peer Clinical Reference project via '&US' facilitating training for young people to engage with patients and parents of young children thus representing 'patient voices' in a quality project

What does your project do?

Works towards engaging patients and families 'voice' giving a platform for patients to express views and for young people to work as partners in care.

Where does your project take place?

Alder Hey Children's Hospital Liverpool

Who does your project help?

Primarily patients and families and staff awareness

Who is involved in your project?

Young people's patient forum, children, parents, & young people

When does your project happen?

The groups meet every 6-8 weeks.

What is your top success or achievement for your project?

Peer Clinical Reference project via '&US' facilitating training for young people to engage with patients and parents of young children thus representing 'patient voices' in a quality project

Anything else you would like to tell us about your child health engagement project?

The patient forums consist of 3 groups: Parents; Young People; Children all groups have been engaged in quality projects to enhance patient experience. The groups have also participated in PLACE inspections. The young people and Children's groups have regularly participated in focus groups for senior management and consultants interviews with the young people directly feeding views back to panel toward formal interviews thus involved in decision making. The forum has also been involved in the design of the new hospital building and now involved in interior design and technology projects.

Tell me about your project in one sentence...

RAilSE is a project which aims to Raise Awareness of Invisible Illnesses in Schools and Education by highlighting that not all illnesses are visible and providing information for education professionals so they can give adequate support for their students.

What does your project do?

Raise awareness of invisible illnesses in schools and promote methods for educational professionals to provide better care.

Where does your project take place?

The project is aimed at schools and all meetings so far have been held at Alder Hey Children's Hospital

Who does your project help?

Young people in education with invisible illnesses and their teachers

Who is involved in your project?

Young people from primary school to post-university age, their parents, education and health professionals and charity representative

When does your project happen?

We host meetings every few months with young people which inform the development of the information pack we are creating.

What is your top success or achievement for your project?

North West Coast Research and Innovation Award for Contribution to Patient and Public Involvement in Research

Anything else you would like to tell us about your child health engagement project?

RAilSE has been a great success since it began last year and momentum for the project has been growing even more so in the last few months. I have had the opportunity to present at several international conferences including the European Medicines Agency and Paediatric Rheumatology European Society. Throughout my research it has become evident that there is a great need for a project such as this due to the high proportion of young people with 'invisible' conditions who are unable to get the support they need in school.

Providing healthy, tasty meals that patients want to eat is a challenge for all hospitals. Here at Great Ormond Street the challenges are even greater to the wide variety of needs our patients have due to their complex needs. We have therefore enlisted the help of patients to do food tasting, suggest items for the menu and even tour the kitchens to help us improve the mealtime experience for patients. Results have included changing a 1 week rotating menu to a 3 week rotating menu, the introduction of meal boxes decorated for animals for smaller children, more child friendly cutlery and plates/ bowls and many others.

What is your top success or achievement for your project?


About to launch a film commissioned and designed by Lister Young Voices showing CYP it's not so scary to come into hospital
